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Update from the Executive Director

Our fall got off to a great start at our first-ever Grocery Industry Summit, hosted in partnership with the Nebraska Cooperative Development Center, in Kearney. Attendees,

including a couple state senators, heard from a variety of panelists, full of helpful information for existing grocers, as well as individuals and communities looking to recruit or retain a store. See pictures and read more on P. 11.

We also had an opportunity in August to meet with Sen. Ricketts, primarily to discuss the Credit Card Competition Act. The Senator took time with our group to listen to all our issues, provide feedback, and he continues to be a champion for business in Washington.

In September, we joined the Governor in the Warner Chamber of the State Capitol, where he signed a proclamation declaring September in Nebraska, "Family Meals Month," an effort to encourage making family meals a priority.

Speaking of the Governor, our tailgates with Governor and First Lady Pillen are a hit. They look a little different this fall, with the addition of a "Volleyball Day in Nebraska" tailgate in August, and the welcome highlight of various nonprofits at each event. Like years past, the Governor and First Lady have embraced these gatherings, and we're so grateful. Saturdays at the residence are a lot of fun (it certainly doesn't hurt that the Huskers are winning), and wouldn't happen without our generous sponsors (P. 22-23).

Our October golf event looked a little different as well. Not only because we were at a different course, Tiburon Golf Club, and got in only nine holes before being rained out, but also because we hosted our Best Bagger competition! Thanks to LinPepCo, all our generous product sponsors, and all the golfers who stuck around for a late lunch and to cheer on our competitors. Our statewide winner, Nolan McGregor, from Fareway Stores in Papillion, will go on to compete in the national Best Bagger Competition at the NGA Show in Law Vegas. See more on P. 25.

In less fun news, it has felt a little "politics as usual" in Washington and Lincoln the last several months. The House of Representatives elected a new speaker, which means they will (for better or worse), be back to work. We continue to lobby our delegation to support the Credit Card Competition Act, which would be a notable step toward sanity in the fees retailers pay on credit card transactions. Our Senators and Representatives have also been really receptive to our calls to keep fees off of SNAP transactions when they take up the next Farm Bill, halt the EPA's war on refrigerants, and bring some commonsense to the FDA's food traceability rule.

At the state level, State Senator Tom Briese of Albion was recently appointed Nebraska State Treasurer, following John Murante's departure for another state role. Governor Pillen recently appointed Fred Meyer of Saint Paul, Nebraska to replace Senator Briese. Mr. Meyer is expected to serve through the 2024 legislative session but has indicated he will not run for the next term. The seat is an important one, given the majority needs every vote they can muster to achieve the 33 votes needed to overcome a fillibuster on legislative priorities.

As a reminder, Nebraska's minimum wage increases to \$12 in January (find additional details and a printable poster on P. 20). NGIA continues our legislative push for a youth and training wage as well as a cap on the CPI increase enacted on the ballot, to help Nebraska businesses remain competitive. Now, the same entities (primarily located out of state) who contributed to the minimum wage ballot initiative, are funding an initiative to establish a paid leave mandate for employers of all sizes.

The ballot is the wrong place to be legislating, in part because there are constitutional restrictions on the subject matter, making them overly broad and unmanageable, especially if the Legislature is unwilling to step in to offer balance. Not every state has this issue – only around half of states allow voters to bypass elected officials and directly enact legislation. To be sure, the NGIA Board of Directors is leaving no option off the table when it comes to fighting unreasonable and costly unfunded mandates.












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NGIA Awards Scholarships to High School & College Students

Nebraska Grocery Industry Association SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM FOR DUES PAYING MEMBERS

Members are asked to make copies of this fact sheet available to their employees.

Purpose/Philosophy

The Nebraska Grocery Industry Association has established the Nebraska Grocery Industry Association Scholarship Program to recognize and aid qualified students who are related to Nebraska's food industry by virtue of their parents' or their own employment by businesses which are dues paying members of the Nebraska Grocery Industry Association (NGIA).

Eligibility

- Employees or children of employees of businesses which pay dues to the Nebraska Grocery Industry Association are eligible to apply for a scholarship.
- 2. All applicants must have been employed for at least one year as of the scholarship deadline and must still be employed at the time the scholarship is awarded.
- 3. Applicants must have a minimum 2.5 GPA on a 4.0 scale. Applicants must plan to enroll in an undergraduate course (full or part time) of study at an accredited two or four year college, university, or vocational-technical school.
 - <u>High School Applicants</u> must be high school seniors <u>Current College Students</u> are eligible to make application for a scholarship each year they are an undergraduate.

<u>Non-Traditional Applicants</u> are classified as: •adult learners

•students who didn't go directly to college after graduating high school or receiving their GED; •students who have experienced an interruption in their higher education for some years and are returning to complete their degree.



Scholarship Award

- 1. The scholarship award will be a grant of \$1,500 which must be used within 12 months of receipt.
- 2. The NGIA scholarship must be applied toward tuition and fees in order to be considered tax-free.

Application Procedure

- 1. Applicants may obtain an application form at our website www.nebgrocery.com.
- Completed applications will be accepted between Jan. 1 and May 15 the year of the award.
 Applications must be postmarked or received by May 15. Applications received after this date will not be considered.

Selection of Winners

- 1. An impartial Selection Committee composed of educators will meet in May to select the winner(s).
- 2. In evaluating the applicants, the committee will consider each applicant's academic record, test scores, extracurricular or workplace activities, recommendations, and a personal essay.
- 3. All applicants are notified of the results of the competition in June.

Responsibilities of Recipients

- Scholarship recipients must enroll as a full-time or part-time student within 12 months of receiving the grant.
- Recipient is responsible for having an Enrollment Certificate completed at the beginning of the term and forwarding a copy of the Certificate via email to NGIA.

Payment of Scholarship Funds

Payment is made directly to the student at the beginning of the academic term upon receipt of an Enrollment Certificate. Any refund of scholarship funds will be made to NGIA and placed back into the fund for redistribution.
